Nominated by: Marguerite Holloway – Breast Cancer Lead – Macmillan	<ul> <li>Shortly after the birth of her twins, Zoe suffered a massive post-partum haemorrhage and then seizures as a result of eclampsia. As a result, the DVLA revoked her driving licence for 6 months, which was devastating for her. Whilst on maternity leave, she undertook a systematic review and meta-analysis of seizure recurrence post-eclampsia and demonstrated that the risk of future</li> </ul>	
AND	seizures was minimal and well below the DVLA's threshold for driving. Publishing this review and lobbying the DVLA successfully changed national guidelines. This ruling came too late for Zoe, but

	<ul> <li>Zoe began working as a consultant oncoplastic breast surgeon in Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board in August 2020, starting her consultant career at the height of the Covid–19 pandemic. In November 2020, she was invited to apply for, and subsequently appointed to, the role of Clinical Specialty Services Director for Breast Services, leading breast services across the Health Board.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>In this role, she has successfully led the development of a stand-alone, state-of-the-art diagnostic breast unit, The Snowdrop Centre, to centralise all breast services across the Health Board. The Snowdrop Centre will open in summer 2022 and will not only bring staff together on one site to provide excellent care, it will also increase diagnostic breast capacity.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>She has successfully designed a job for and recruited a breast clinician, a brand-new role for the Health Board and an innovative way of increasing diagnostic breast clinic capacity; she also successfully bid for Macmillan funding for a secondary breast cancer nurse, again, the first role of its type in the Health Board</li> </ul>

- In September 2021, Zoe's senior colleague, mentor and friend was sadly diagnosed with metastatic cancer. She saw the opportunity of her colleague's absence to support a senior registrar to act up; personally mentored that person; whilst also increasing her own workload to meet the needs of the service.

The feedback we now receive from the Cancer Advisory Groups and the 30 MDTs we support has transformed the situation from a culture where complaints abounded to one where our department is held in the highest regard. This has taken a massive team effort but has relied on the leadership and vision of a person who has a work ethic to envy, the respect of all his colleagues and is genuinely a nice person – Dr Aslam.
	Dr Aslam then pushed and continues to push the department into the most exciting innovations. He remains pivotal in our adoption of digital slide scanning and more recently, he's driven our department into the field of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in cancer diagnosis. He has collaborated with partners from industry but more importantly has engaged with his consultant colleagues to not only consider the use of AI but have it become a very important tool in prostate, and now breast, pathology.
	Dr Aslam has realized the importance of new technology and introduced it into routine practice. He also supports these developments for colleagues in laboratories throughout Wales and chairs the Standing Scientific Advisory Group for Cellular Pathology together with groups to support and advance digital pathology.
	In order to achieve the improvements we've seen, we've relied not only on Dr Aslam's vision but also his preparedness to support the minutiae – he always has the time to discuss, to plan, to support and be a teammember. He has guided us into areas that were once science fiction and has shown us what great things we can accomplish together – always for the patient.

	Mr Moosa has been instrumental in developing the new day case operating theatres in Prince Philip, which will be built thanks to nearly £20m of Welsh Government funding and will include preparation rooms, anaesthetic rooms, changing facilities and a recovery area. The theatres will have capacity to run 24 sessions a week, covering procedures including orthopaedics, general surgery, urology, vascular and laser therapy for varicose veins. The new facilities are expected to deliver approximately 585 additional day cases per year for Urology services.

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
